Elementary Essentials from Mrs. Maher

While we haven't left April behind, yet the students have a remarkable internal clock that tends to run a few weeks fast. Parents, teachers, and, yes, students need to work together to keep priorities in order. Organization and maintaining routines are key at home and in the classrooms.

As the end of the school year approaches, here are a few reminders that, though seemingly minor, will make the last weeks of school much smoother.

- **Keep school work first and sports second.** Spring sports have begun, so make sure that school work remains a high priority.
- **Get adequate sleep.** With so many obligations pulling at all of us, don't shortchange a good night's rest.
- **Pack a healthy morning snack as well as a healthy lunch.** With all the extra activities our students participate in, putting quality "fuel" in the tank makes learning easier.
- **Chose the right clothes for the weather.** Shorts season begins on May 1st. Be prudent about the choice of wearing shorts. The weather can change quickly and students will go outside every day unless it's raining.
- **Remember to follow ALL the car line rules.** Do NOT park in the circle during morning drop off—this causes many back-ups. In the afternoon please continue to use the car line, as this is the most efficient and, above all, the safest way to dismiss our students.

As always, watch the May/June calendar and read all classroom correspondence. There are many activities and field trips, and **permission slips are an absolute necessity.** Students should not need to use the phone to call home if you remember to check that calendar every day.

Trekking Club Returns for Gr. 3 – 5 Students

Our first outings of the spring on the trails at Knauff Park have been hit or miss given Michigan's dynamic weather. Remember, students are not allowed to call home during the school day to make transportation arrangements for extra-curricular events, which should be made before school. If it rains or, perish the thought, *snows* anytime during the school day (7am-3pm), trekking will be cancelled.

One of the most important life-long academic skills we learned is to strive to always turn in quality work, and to check our work before turning it in to be graded. Another related skill is to take a look at those graded papers, and make every effort to improve areas that need attention. These skills show growing maturity!

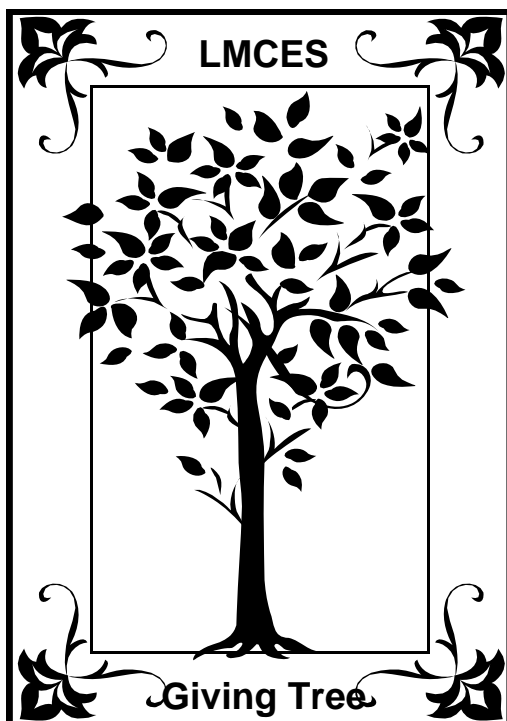
