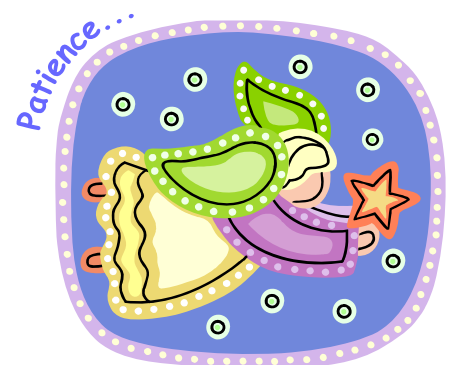

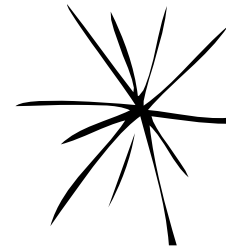

The oral presentations of the characters from the *Dear America* series proved to 4<sup>th</sup> Graders that learning about our nation's history can be both informative and entertaining. All the students did a great job presenting their characters.

The Family Tree projects we created took a lot of time and effort but the work was worth it because we learned so much about our ancestry and heritage. Mrs. Zetts asked us to be creative, and we sure took her up on that request. Trees with colorful, glittering leaves, posters of fish families, shamrocks or bunches of balloons, flowering trellises and mobiles hanging from the ceiling were just some of the ways we displayed our projects. It was intriguing to hear some of the odd names and learn of about our ancestors' countries. Did you know that two of **Morgan G.'s** ancestors signed the Mayflower Compact? We discovered that **Sarah K.** is of royal blood, having a Hungarian king and queen as ancestors. **Reagan H.** is a descendent of Johann Gutenberg, the inventor of the printing press, and **August T.** is related to Betsy Ross. Many of us brought in traditional ethnic foods to share with the class. **Maggie T.** gave us Irish soda bread. We had a taste of delicious Polish cookies thanks to **Maddie M.** We will always remember the Italian sweet bread, pannatone that **Andrew A.** brought for us to eat. Thanks to the parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles who helped us to trace our ancestry and learn more about our own heritage and ourselves.

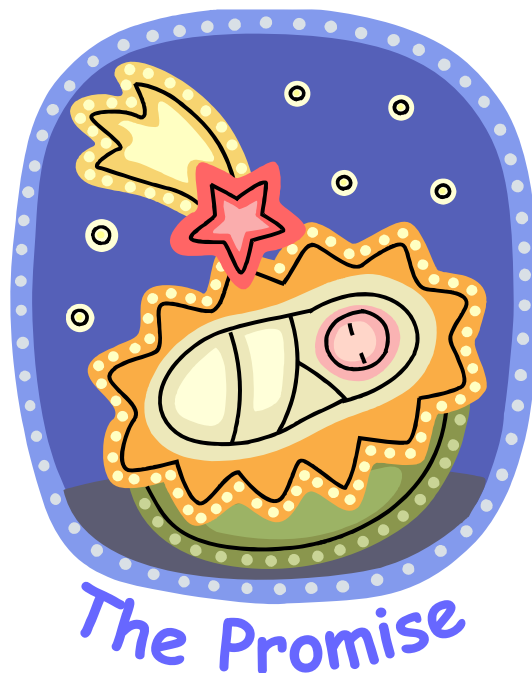

The Troop's Christmas events continued with participation in the Reindog Parade, finally winding up with the end of the year holiday party and making gingerbread houses.

In the new year, there's much more to be excited about, including the Girl Scout Cookie Sale, a visit to Camp Soni, and International Bazaar where our girls will present the country of Brazil.

Regarding the business side of Girl Scouts, there were many organizational changes in October with Girl Scouts USA. 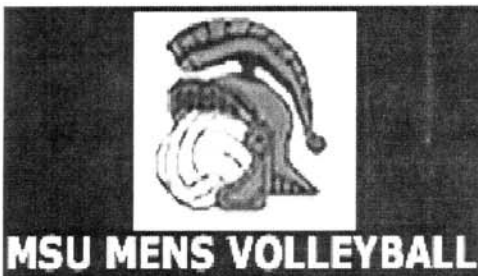
